"SUCCULESSENSE: HINTS TO CAPTURING A PLANT'S CHARACTER IN YOUR PHOTOGRAPHY"

ABOUT OUR SPEAKER

Pursuing his passion over his profession, Irwin closed his law practice of 29 years to become a fulltime photographer. From 2010 through 2013, he was a staff photographer, then head of the photography department of the Wilson History and Research Center in Little Rock Arkansas. Since that time, he has pursued his artistic vision. Specializing in highly detailed, artistic images of cacti and succulents, Irwin's images are widely published and collected. Publications that featured his work include the Cactus and Succulent Journal. Hasseltonia. Sansevieria. To The Point. CactusWorld. several National Geographic publications, and the new Dudleya book. In addition to private workshops and numerous programs for plant societies and photography clubs throughout the country, he's led workshops and programs sponsored by the Dallas Museum of Art, the International Photography Hall of Fame, The Huntington, the North America Association of Nature Photography, and the CSSA. Irwin is formerly the President of the North Texas Cactus and Succulent Society. He is Vice President, a member of the Board of Directors, and Co-Chairs the Conservation Committee of the Cactus and Succulent Society of America.

EUPHORBIA FLANAGANII: MEDUSA HEAD





I started my collection of cactus and succulents after visiting the homes of my friends and expressing interest in their collection. Before I knew it, I was going home with bags full of cuttings and plants in pots that were no longer needed. I ended up with some euphorbia such as Euphorbia ingens and Euphorbia tirucalli, but my friend Ralph told me that his wife was nearly blinded by it when they were cutting it back. I thought that spiky was dangerous enough, so at the time I re-gifted the euphorbia I had and made it a point to not collect any. But early last year I inherited a Cleistocactus strausii, Echinopsis, Hoya, and the Medusa head from my grandma, which I thought looked like a weird sea anemone. Initially I didn't know it was a euphorbia, but once I figured it out, I couldn't let it go. From there I learned to appreciate them and began to grow my collection euphorbias..


HABITAT

Euphorbia flanaganii can only be found in the coastal areas of the Eastern Cape and south coast of KwaZulu-Natal in South Africa. According to South African National Biodiversity Institute (SANBI), they like to live off cliff edges, where their clones can drop off and find new places to live. After observing its growth habit for over a year and a half, I can see how they get around.

CULTIVATION AND USES

• Euphorbia flanaganii is mostly used as an ornamental plant in landscaping and does well in a container. My grandma kept hers in a hanging basket. I have not repotted them in the nearly two years I've had them, and they seem to be very happy and growing well. Just like most Euphorbia, E. flanaganii are very easy to grow and propagate. You can get new plants from collected seeds or by division. The whole plant and specifically the latex is also used in traditional medicine in South Africa (SANBI).

SOIL AND POTTING

Since I have not changed anything to my *Euphorbia flanaganii* since inheriting it, I have been able to propagate by division by breaking off the pups that hang off the side of the basket. The connecting stems are easy to break off without releasing the sap. I use E.B. Stone Cactus and Succulent mix on all my cactus and succulents but would like to learn to make my own.

WATER

During the spring and summer, I water the pots once a week, making sure to wait a little longer if the soil is still moist from the previous week's watering. In the winter, I water once a month.

RALPH MORAN

LIGHTING OR SUN EXPOSURE

Euphorbia flanaganii love the sun. I put them in full sun, and they had no problems when we had that heat wave a couple months ago. If you must grow it indoors, place it in bright indirect light.

WINTER

I live in West Chula Vista, where it can occasionally get cold and has dipped in the low 30's a couple of times. The brief cold was ok for my plants, but they cannot take any frost and should be winterized or brought indoors if it gets too cold.

SUMMARY

If you want a cool plant that is easy to grow and propagate, and will add texture to your garden at home, you should get yourself a *Euphorbia flanaganii*. People will notice how weird the plant is and want it for their own garden. I have already given cuttings to friends that have commented on this unique plant.




