HAWORTHIAS: WHAT'S IN A NAME?

HAWORTHIAS: WHAT'S IN A NAME? ARTICLE BY KEVIN HOSMER



hen I arrived in San Diego about 18 years ago, a succulent fanatic was born. Perhaps I should say germinated. It took a few more years before I discovered Haworthias. They've been nothing but trouble ever since.

Many SoCal gardeners have likely paid little attention to Haworthias. They're not landscaping candidates; typically a few inches in diameter and a few inches tall. Blooms are nothing to rave about – consistently white & green, very small, few in number ... forgettable. Extreme summer heat sends the plants into "Summer Sulk"—shriveled & gray leaves, seemingly lifeless, and beyond resuscitation. I annually bemoan August thru November—"Why do I like these plants?!" Only when cool weather returns do my plants miraculously rebound, and I become infatuated all over again.

These small succulents are native mostly to areas within modern-day South Africa. The genus was originally named "Haworthia" to honor British botanist (& entomologist), Adrian Hardy Haworth, in 1809. There are approximately one hundred or so species—a number that is being frequently revised as botanists reclassify plant groups and decipher natural hybrids. There seems to be consistent agreement that Haworthias are closely related to aloes (Family = Aloaceae per Linnaean taxonomy). Many people are familiar with "hard leaf" species, H. fasciata or H. attenuate—both frequently available in my local pharmacy. My preference and experience are the "soft leaf" Haworthias that thrive in bright shade or morning sunlight and a damp substrate during the San Diego wet season. When hot weather arrives, beware rotting with frequent and/or too much water!

I am not an ardent fan of many haworthia species. *H. bayeri* is attractive, *H. bolusii* is interesting, *H. truncata* has insane architecture, and diminutive *H. parksiana* I can only describe as cute. The real Haworthia attraction – the hybrids!

HAWORTHIAS: WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Haworthias do not readily self-fertilize; a second plant is required. Hybridization can occur between many, perhaps most, species. And if hybrids hybridize...who can accurately guess what the progeny will look like? I devote several hours each day, March – June, harvesting pollen from one plant and carefully placing it upon the stigmas of another plant's flowers. My inner Dr. Frankenstein revealed.

On my plant benches, each adult plant is assigned a letter code: A to Z, AA to AZ, ... to infinity. There's a lot of small writing so label brevity is important: labeled flower spikes, labeled pollen containers (pill boxes), labeled seed containers (pill boxes), labeled sprouting containers (bottle caps), labeled pots, and labeled flat rows. A typical label might read "2022 M x CB" (pod parent x pollen parent). The year is critical in case I retired a plant and substituted another. Now let's assume in 2024 that I like one of the progeny from M x CB and I intend to keep it. Will I always think of it as "M x CB"? Probably NOT.

I recently purchased hybrid Haworthia plants already named "Painted Skin", "Silver Mutica', and a "Tutankhamun" cross. What images do those names evoke? All accurately describe an appearance. Great marketing!

Alternatively, names can provide scientific description, convey ownership, demonstrate meaningful personal significance, and bring order to chaos. Perhaps a name is dictated by a preexisting name sequence. The names of the following two plants in our (Kevin Hosmer & Rick Bjorklund) collection were inspired by scientific description.

ISI 2003-28 Haworthia 'Gray Salt'

"This slow-growing hybrid of H. truncata and H. angustifolia ... Fine white papillae near the leaf tips appear crystalline but in addition seem to wick salts toward the apex, leaving fine mineral deposits on older leaves. This along with the epidermal color suggested the cultivar name for this hybrid" (source)

"Haworthia 'Gray Salt' ... as a potential parent in 2006 when she crossed it with H. pygmaea var. argenteo-maculosa... Leaves of dark green are patterned with a few irregular, light-green lines surmounted by translucent ridges bearing small postulate white papillae. This gives the plant a salted look, inspiring the cultivar name. ..." (source)

Based upon these descriptions—I cannot believe we possess these plants! Certainly, I didn't purchase them. Thank goodness I didn't study botany. Test question: describe these plants; my answers, Ugly & A Little Better. Haworthia hybridization has come a long way.

I used *Haworthia* 'Grain of Salt' in my hybridization efforts, so I have a suggestion for the next generation in this sequence: *Haworthia* 'NaCl'.

I have developed a different strategy for naming my Haworthia hybrids. Unsuspecting SDCSS members have been an inspiration, but they may find I've taken some liberties! For example, sitting at the 2023 Summer Show & Sale Information Booth, I was present as my friend, Candy Garner, handled several simultaneous inquiries. Setup was barely complete; more coffee was needed; frustration overload. I'm still laughing – a brief moment, but *Haworthia* "Fried Candy" emerged! (see this issue's cover).

I will share a bit more about the process of naming my Haworthia hybrids at the August meeting.






