

oin us on Saturday, October 10th at 12:30pm PST for our next club webinar, "The Cacti of San Luis Potosí México" by speaker Juan Miguel Artigas Azas!

Juan considers himself a naturalist. Although he was trained as a civil engineer, a profession which he loves and on which he has made a living for more than 35 years, he has always been in contact with the natural environment. He has studied and written on cichlid fishes for many years and taken thousands of underwater

pictures of them in Africa, South America, Central and North America. He has also studied and photographed many freshwater fishes of Mexico. Additionally, for many years Juan has also studied and written on cacti, managing pictures of blooming plants in habitat of hundreds of species. Euphorbia platyclada, often called the 'dead plant,' is from Madagascar, as are many other truly strange plants. Its coloring varies from pink and brown to green and brown and sometimes orange. It may grow upright, sprawl parallel to the ground, or both. The flowers are so tiny you can hardly see them. It takes a special person to love them.

Euphorbia decaryi decaryi, another Madagascar native. This plant was growing in a deep 4 inch pot for about 10 years with little change. When removed from the pot, it had a caudex belowground much bigger than what showed above. Cute little brown flowers.





Euphorbia monocantha

Euphorbia monocantha aka 'Mrs. Ash.' I don't know who Mrs. Ash is, but this is a cute little plant. It had been sitting at the back of a shelf when I discovered it in my greenhouse a couple years ago. Date on the tag was 2008. I put her in a new pot. She is happy, but remains pretty small.

Euphorbia gymnocalycioides has little chins like its namesake cactus. It has been around the collection for about 10 years with very little change - it is 2 inches in diameter. Love the spiral that diminishes beyond sight in the center.

Euphorbia francoisii is another species from Madagascar. It also was much bigger below ground than above before I exposed its caudex. Leaves are green and red, long and narrow, or short and round. Flowers are green. Strange and beautiful.

Euphorbia obesa is another odd ball, and is commonly called 'golf ball.' They generally grow as a single, round plant which slowly grows taller. This one is quite old- about five inches tall and must have gotten lonely at some point and grew this little appendage.












